"Find It"

Sight word recognition activity or assessment

Excellent assessment to see if students can recognize the sight word being practiced. Have students color in, circle or highlight the sight word on the "Find It" table.

After students complete the "Write It" activity, I let them do some fun sight word chalkboard time. They can use the "Find It" page to practice writing multiple sight words.





Fine motor fun! Use this as a Play-Doh mat first to "roll" the sight word, and then color! OR...

Give students some scrap construction paper and let them color in the sight word by doing some fun tear art! I keep a bin of scrap construction paper just for this!



"Connect It"

More fine motor and counting fun! Students do a connect-the-dot by numbers to finish the sight word.



Book Box

Cut a cereal box in half. Cover it in contact paper (wrapping paper is cute too). Write the students' name on it. Store these on a bookshelf for students to have easy access. *I let students grow their own sight word library. They love rereading their books!
