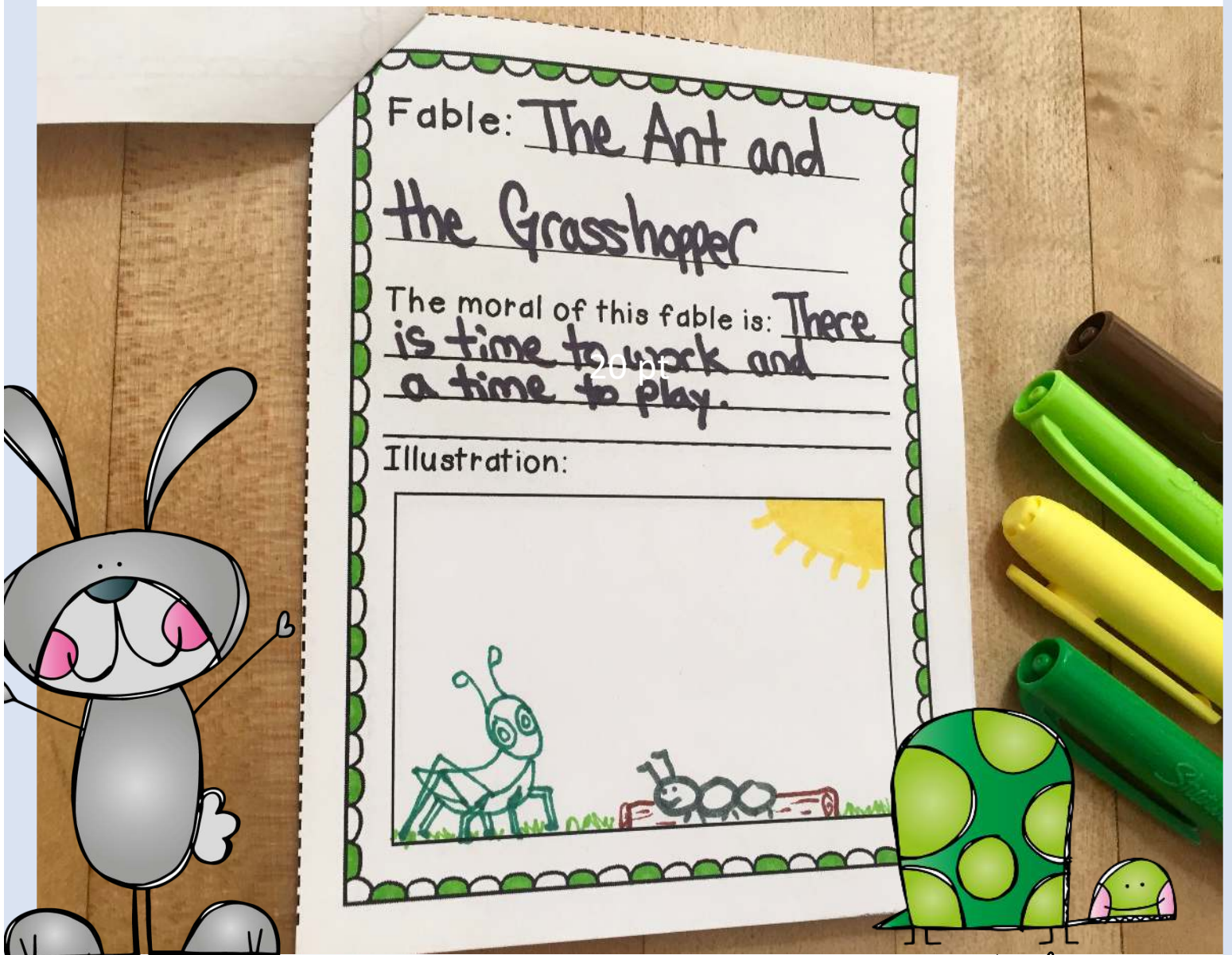


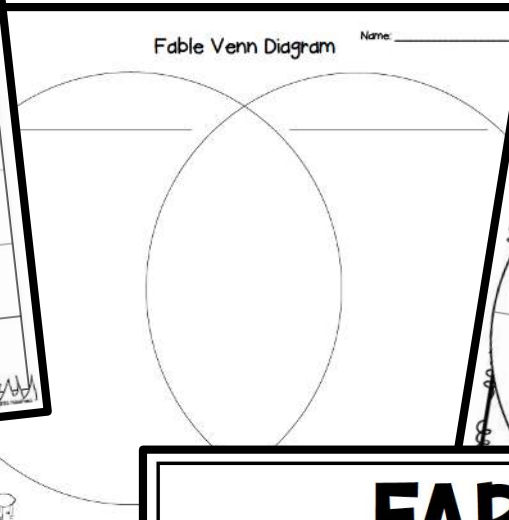

Fable Story Elements Wheel

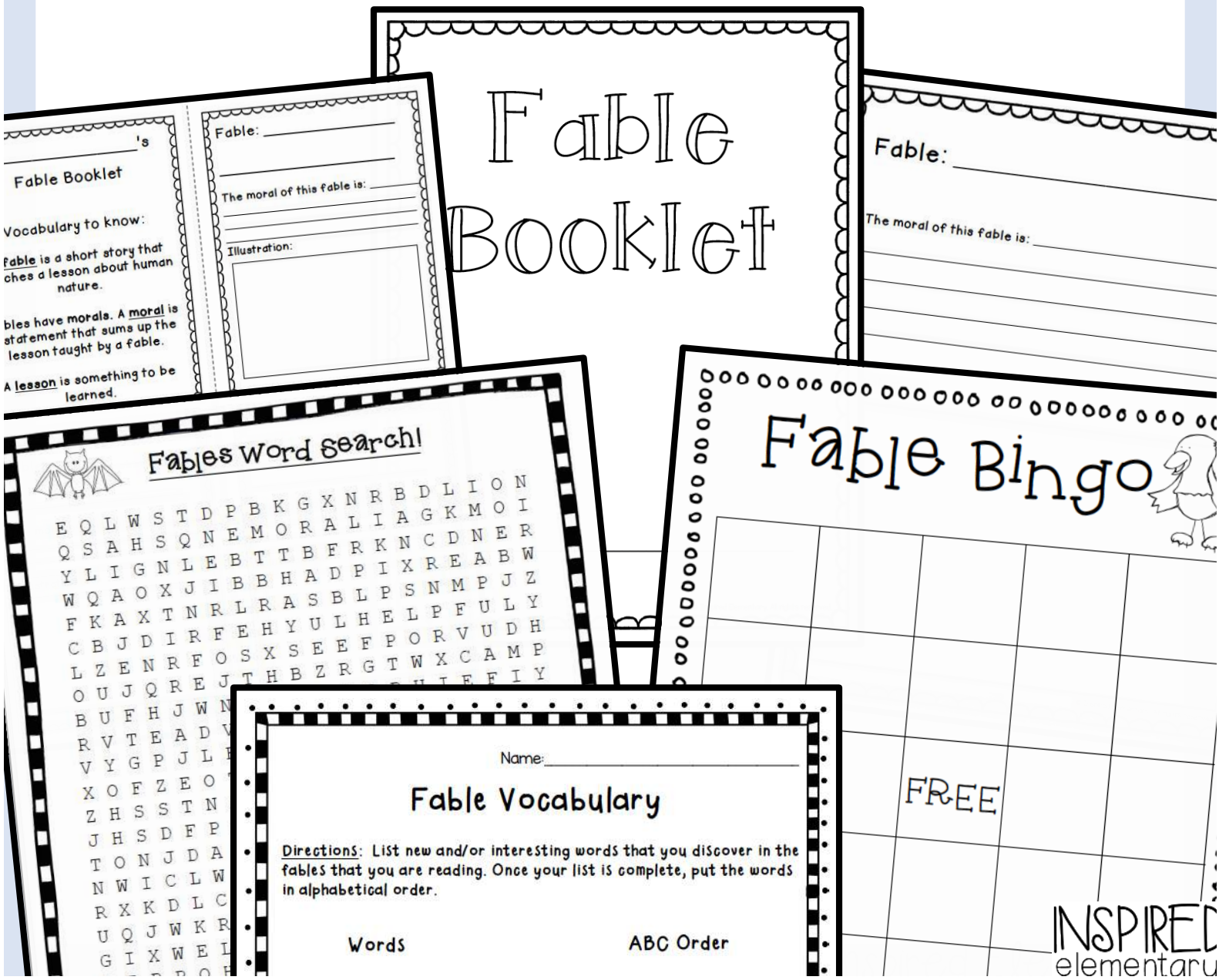
